2	Accept minutes of last meeting			
2.1	Actions from the February meeting are as follows:			
	Item 3.8 regarding provision of Patrick's updated Subplans is closed. These were distributed and no comments were received.			
	Regarding action 3.9 concerning mercury issues raised by the local community, JB			

	noted that there was still some community concern over the unscheduled report on local mercury contamination tabled by A Helps of AG Recoveries at the December Orica CLC meeting. Orica is looking into the issues raised but won't be posting the report on its website as Orica cannot sanction or agree with all of the report contents. The EPA will also be looking into the Helps report. JB will update the CCC of further developments.		
	Regarding item 6.3, correspondence has gone to the Department of Planning & Infrastructure confirming that the Committee will also be the operational group and a response is yet to be received.

3	Update on construction and activities		
3.1	Sydney International Container Terminal Works         Presentation by SICTL including:         - Out of hours approval for concrete batch plant         - Other works CEMP         KM reported that civil works are progressing with Laing O'Rourke works 60-70% finished. The stacking yard is about half completed. Groundworks are almost finished. Pavement is about 50% complete. Underground services are installed. The main substation and cabling is complete.         The quay cranes will be delivered at the end of the month and ship to shore cranes in mid July.         Most of the site has been sealed, reducing dust impacts with the only remaining potential for dust being the stockpiles. The works are on schedule for the initial		

3.3	<ul> <li>work application for the concrete batch plant. This is to avoid issues associated with the concrete curing in the heat of the day.</li> <li>Noise monitoring in Dent St and Australia Ave indicated work was inaudible at these locations. Monitoring will continue.</li> <li>Notifications to residents in the surrounding area were distributed.</li> <li>BE asked when out of hours work is likely to occur, noting night noise complaints at the end of April occurring when out of hours work was to proposed to start.</li> <li>JA replied that out of hours work occurs only as required, for example if hot conditions are expected during the day. Noise will be monitored. Dent St and Australia Ave are the closest residential streets. There are no reversing alarms as quackers are used.</li> <li>SH reported noise complaints were likely due to port operational noise rather than construction related.</li> <li>PJ asked about timing for the noisewall.</li> </ul>		
	JA replied that piles have gone in to be followed by pile caps, then panels will be placed. It is expected to be finished in the next few months.		
3.4	JA reported that for the EPIC agenda Laing O'Rourke is looking to have 50 to 100 people available to work on Bushcare in the Randwick Council area. JA will follow this up with BE. JB suggests they also engage with Botany Bay Council around removal of Bitou Bush in Sir Joseph Banks Park.

3.6	<ul> <li>AL reported that proposed Ramp D is an additional further incoming ramp for trucks entering the terminal.</li> <li>MM and IK delivered a presentation which was distributed at the meeting.</li> <li>MM reported that Ramp D connects to the elevated structure then continues through port on a reinforced earth structure. Fulton Hogan has started to develop the concept design. The second stage will be construction. There will be some demolition works of existing buildings and relocation of services. The Argus building will be relocated to temporary accommodation then moved to the main administration building. 4.2	BE asked whether noise monitoring has indicated exceedances. JA reported that noise monitoring is undertaken during the day. Construction noise is inaudible, but monitoring picks up background noise. BE suggests it would be good to notify the community that monitoring is occurring and that there are no exceedances due to construction. 4.3	PP noted people are fishing from the rock wall at the southern end of the Boat Ramp area. He asked whether water quality is satisfactory. JA replied there is no construction impact on the waterway. KM notes rainwater is captured and treated before release.			
4.4	<ul> <li>Penrhyn Estuary Post-Construction monitoring program update <u>Presentation by SPC (MM)</u></li> <li>SH distributed a summary of results from the first 12 months of post construction monitoring. The report has been done by Cardno. It indicates: <ul> <li>Water Quality is comparable to other sites in Botany Bay.</li> <li>Saltmarsh is healthy with few dead plants and no invasion of grey mangroves.</li> <li>Benthos – targets for biomass have been reached</li> <li>Shorebirds – numbers are down on previous years, but this is also the case on the southern side of the Bay.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Seagrass persists on Foreshore Beach. The transplant area at Quibray Bay has been one of the few successful transplants of seagrass.</li> </ul>	SPC (SH) to send the website link for Penrhyn Estuary monitoring to CCC members. 	Results for the first of the five year monitoring have generally been good. The detailed report will be on the website in two weeks.			
4.5	TB asked whether there is a strategy beyond five years. SH replied there is ongoing commitment and maintenance contracts past that time but monitoring is for five years. PJ noted the success criteria was established prior to construction and there are financial penalties for not achieving these.			
4.6	PP asked whether the seagrasses along Foreshore Beach have been impacted by the drift of sands. PJ noted there has been a long decline in the density of the seagrass bed.			
4.7	Foreshore Beach stabilisation works update SH reported on the two proposed groynes with the results from physical modeling, financed by Sydney Ports and Sydney Water, expected by July. Modeling results will be presented to the CCC. Computer modeling suggests two groynes are needed. The physical model is being undertaken to confirm this. It is hoped to solve the long shore drift. SPC has allocated money for the groynes which will be located in the vicinity of the Sydney Water storm water pipes. There are also flooding issues in Botany Bay Council area which are suspected to be exacerbated by blockages of the storm water pipes.			
4.8	PP asked whether the overflow of sewerage was also part of the concern for Sydney Water. SH replied that with the long shore drift sand is going towards Millsteam which has potential impacts on Sydney Water flows from the lakes areas. There was some discussion of Sydney Water's response in the past. 6.1	Modification No. 14 Temporary Uses of		
	Tug Berth Area		
	PJ reported that once approval is received		
	from the DP&,I temporary uses of the tug		
	berth area can occur for tugs, bunker barges		
	and other ports vessels. This area is at the		
	northern end of the SICTL development.		
	BE asked whether there will be noise walls

	Sydney Ports and SICTL indicated there is no noise wall along the northern end of the		
	development.

	EP reported that landowners consent has		

7	been received from SPC for an application to the DP&I to change consent condition C2.22 regarding piercing the Obstacle Limitation Surface. This would bring construction and operational limits into line, raising the limit, for example, for boom cranes and the unloading of quay cranes. KM noted this is a controlled breach potentially for both construction and operation covering cranes and could extend to ships' height limitations. Patrick has approval for their existing cranes to breach the OLS. Modifications for planning approval have to come to this committee. <b>Other Matters/next meeting</b>			
7.1	Requirements prior to Terminal commencing operations KM reported there is a requirement to consult the community for the Operational and Environmental Management Plan. TB reported that the first draft is finished. It will be circulated to members in advance of the next CCC meeting and sub-plans will distributed as they become available. 7.2	Long term lease of Port Botany SH reported that following the NSW Government announcement regarding the long term lease of the land at Port Botany, the final bids closed in early April. An announcement has been made that the successful bidder is NSW Ports, a consortium of mainly Australian super funds with an Abu Dhabi investment fund. This will take effect on May 31. The CCC will continue as is.
